In 2021, John Green raised funds for the Royal British League Poppy Appeal by marching 100K in full WW1 uniform. He had been inspired by the late Sir "Captain" Tom's fundraising in for the NHS.

In this Platinum year, John now 87 years old undertook a similar challenge. This time 70K in 70hrs.

In August he ventured out each day bravely dressed again in full WW1 uniform, brandishing a decommissioned rifle, and to show he has fully embraced the 21st Century carried a SumUp machine which takes credit card payments, his latest boy's toy! His Trek started each day from his home in Maidensgrove and back, on a circular route via Blue Tin Produce farm shop and The Black Horse pub in Checkendon.



On Wedneday at his designated stop-over, the Black Horse Pub, John was presented with an award by the RBL National Vice Chairman Lynda Atkin, in the presence of Pete Eldridge County Chair of RBL Oxfordshire, Cllr Kelly Hinton of Henley Town Council together with Cllr Stefan Gawrysiak, Catherine Notaras and Chair of RBL Henley & Peppard Branch, Anne Evans. This special award was in recognition of John's phenomenal fundraising for the Poppy Appeal over the years since the 1970's



Henley Debt Counselling Centre - Launch of CAP Christians Against Poverty

Four churches in Henley have teamed up to open a Christians Against Poverty (CAP) debt counselling service for people in Henley who are struggling financially.

This initiative was launched on 18 July and will be headed by Olympic rowing silver medal winner, Debbie Bruwer previously Debbie Flood.

"Living with debt or financial worries is extremely difficult. It affects so many areas of people's lives – relationships, physical and mental health, not being able to afford the basic essentials. It can also be very isolating.

"As a compassionate church community, we want to be there to support local people in need, work with them on their route out of debt, providing emotional and practical support every step of the way until they go debt free."

Although the service is backed by Christians Against Poverty, you don't have to be a Christian to get help. Terry Grourk, Trustee, Henley on Thames Churches Debt Centre said, "Debbie has received extensive professional training from CAP and the Debt Centre hopes to offer not just debt counselling but in the future training courses for people who are sliding into debt and a Job Club to help people into work."

Andy Jones from Henley's Citizens Advice Bureau and Tim Prior, Manager of Nomad Youth & Community Project agreed that there is such a misconception that everyone in Henley is rich! They see struggling families every day, and are excited to be able to refer

people to a local set up that provides free, compassionate help to people in real need.

Anne Evans and John Green were invited to the Launch, and feel that with these amazing initiatives growing up in Henley, that we, the local RBL Branch, have an increased chance of locating ex-service men and women and their families who would benefit from help the RBL can offer. We find it difficult to pin-point exactly who in the community needs our help - individuals are proud and therefore 'soldier' on to the detriment of their health and welbeing. Remarkable men we knew

I wonder how many of this generation now wish they had spoken to their relative about the part they played in the war, both 1st and 2nd ! It's only on their death that the full picture is revealed.

I had the honour of being Bill Green's daughter-in-law but it was only by reading his obituary that I gathered the story of his remarkable life in the Royal Navy and that in the 2nd World War he was principal navigator responsible for getting the small fleet of 19 ships, elite commandos and the destroyer HMS Campbeltown - which was loaded with explosives - up the estury to destroy the heavily fortified Normandy dry dock at St Nazaire in German-occupied France. He was twice decorated for bravery and outstanding devotion to duty.

By 1941 the war was going badly for England, the convoys bringing food and guns across from America were under constant attack. Hitler planned to send the mighty Tirpitz to wreak further havoc in the Atlantic and knowing that the British would attack and probably damage the Tirpitz, St Nazaire was the only dock which could accommodate Tirpitz's size. So the British plan, conceived and carried out within three weeks, was to destroy the dock.

The revised Combined Operations plan required one destroyer to ram the dock gates and a number of smaller craft to transport the commandos. The Royal Navy would therefore provide the largest contingent for the raid, under the overall command of the senior naval officer, **Commander Robert Ryder**. A mighty dangerous undertaking, which involved loading the Campbeltown, an aged destroyer with a huge amount of explosives and use the ship to ram the gates of the dry dock and blow itself up.







St Nazaire was targeted because the loss of its dry dock would force any large German warship in need of repairs, such as Tirpitz, sister ship of Bismarck, to return to home waters by running the gauntlet of the Home Fleet of the Royal Navy and other British forces, via the English Channel or the North Sea. The Tirpitz never put to sea again!

The attack on St Nazaire has been described as the greatest raid in the 2nd World War, and Lieutenant Cl 'Bill' Green especially chosen as principal navigator was pivotal in getting all 19 ships and commandos to the right place at the right time in the middle of the night.

To make it even more remarkable, the convoy set out in daylight and to deceive the enemy headed as if for Gibraltar, only turning to France in the dark, making navigating the narrow estuary an extremely delicate operation.

Commander 'Red' Ryder (whoes own bravery won him the Victoria Cross) in a book he wrote after the war about the raid, in his final summary wrote:

'Looking back over the stirring events which I have attempted to describe in the forgoing chapters, I feel that I should now emphasise what was, perhaps, our main worry. The ordinary hazards of navigating a river at night without any lights or buoys would be no easy task after a 450 mile voyage. The fact that Bill Green not only piloted the force unerringly up the Loire but calculated his time of arrival within 4 minutes was one of the major factors contributing to the success of the action.

His ability on this occasion met with unstinted praise from the Loire pilots, who considered this feat of pilotage to be without parallel in the history of the port. Lieutenant Green, who was specially selected for this appointment, also acted as my chief staff officer in all other matters; It is proper, therefore, that his contribution should be fully recorded. To the unsolicited tribute of the Loire pilots I would like to add that Green's ability and assurance on this testing occasion has impressed itself on me as one of the outstanding features of the raid. "The Man Behind the Gun" STRUMA VALLEY 25/1/1917

This remarkable 2" x 4" notebook was found at a carboot sale in Benson in 1993. It belonged to a gunner (Royal Artillery) serving in Salonika (Thesaloniki) during WW1. Written in a miniscule copperplate hand, it contained a doggerel poem 'The Man Behind the gun' and cartoons and verses penned by his comrades-in-arms 1916 – 18.

Sights not seen Macedonia

The first page of the notebook is headed "STRUMA VALLEY 25/1/1917 followed by comrades' signatures and the phrase "to be continued in Blighty". We are left to wonder if that ever happened!

The Salonika campaign began 5 October 1915 with the landing of the 10th (Irish) and French 156th Division at Salonika. The rationale for sending troops to the Balkans was to deter Bulgaria from joining Germany and Austro-Hungarian Empire in an attack on Serbia, our ally.

The Sturma Valley saw a series of actions against Bulgarian and Turkish positions. The valley was infested with malaria and both sides tried to avoid fixed positions. Malaria was more the cause of incapacity on both sides than enemy fire! The British Forces' newspaper was called the MOSQUITO !

WW2 Peoples's War - Henley on Thames

"This photograph shows me, Philip Pengilley, aged 10 and my elder brother Roy, taken in 1939. The uniform is of Henley-on-Thames Trinity Hall Lads Brigade which was given out for monthly church parades and the annual camps which were mostly taken at Beachy Head, Eastbourne.

If memory serves me right, this last camp before the outbreak of war, was also taken at Beachy Head, though it may have been at Felpham, near Bognor Regis. A band always led the various parades and consisted of drum and fife with buglers. The 'gongs' worn were for progress in music, in both cases here, for the flute. Jack Banbury was bandmaster, assisted by Charlie Bund. Charlie Piper was in charge overall with 'Ginger' Talbot second in command.

I was told war had been declared on my way home from singing in our church choir by an older boy, at least 13-yearsold, and told to hurry home. Things began to happen with the building of shelters in some roads (in the centre of Station Road for instance) and in the National School's gardens, the issuing of gas masks and the arrival from London, (shouted ell-oh-en-dee-oh-en) loud and clear, of the first group of young evacuees."



This photograph was taken by 541 Squadron possibly from a Gloster Meteor or a Lancaster on 18th June 1945, for mapping purposes after hostilities ceased.

A two day regatta was staged between Victory in Europe Day 8th May and Victory over Japan Day 15th August. (you can see the rowing boats).

This has to be the ultimate "you can see our house from here" picture, assuming you live in Henley on Thames. Even if you don't, compare it with the same area on Google earth.

Download it and pump it up, the detail is extraordinary. If you look closely you can actually see a small RAF plane!
