'Lest we Forget'



Michael Willoughby and his wife Lesley of Henley and on behalf of 'Lest we Forget' placed poppy crosses (modified as attached picture) given to them by the Local Branch of RBL, on the graves and memorials on 290 soldiers and airmen in their recent 12 day trip of over 1000 miles around Belgium and France.

One such grave was of Lieut. John Edwin Pugh RFC at Gosselies Cemetery. He rowed for Shrewsbury School at Henley Regatta in 1914 and was the last British Airman shot down in WW1. He died of his wounds the following day on 12th November 1918 aged 19.

GREAT PILGRIMAGE 90

DATE - Sunday 5 August 2018 - Thursday 9 August 2018 LOCATION - Ypres, Belgium

In the biggest membership event in its history, The Royal British Legion is recreating its 1928 pilgrimage to World War One battlefields.

A decade after the end of WW1, veterans and war widows visited the battlefields of the Somme and Ypres before marching to the Menin Gate in Ypres on 8 August 1928.

Exactly 90 years later, thousands of Legion members will recreate The 1928 Great Pilgrimage to visit the same battlefields and then, on 8 August 2018, carry their standards along the same route to the Menin Gate, to commemorate the last 100 days of WW1 and represent an entire generation that served while defending their country

Members of the public are welcome to watch the parade to the Menin Gate where a Remembrance service will be held. Following the service, spectators can head to the Great Square for an afternoon of exhibitions and musical performances.

Additionally, an organised tour commemorating the last 100 days of WW1 includes the GP90 event. The five day tour visits battlefield sites in France and Belgium such as Ypres, Mons and Loos.

Henley Primary Schools Remember



Year 5 pupils from Sacred Heart, Badgemore, St Mary's and Rupert House primary schools took part in a Remembrance Day event at Makins recreational ground on 11 November.

Cllr Dave Eggleton had arranged the gathering at which each school composed and read a poem about what the red poppy means to them.

John Green addressed the pupils and explained the full significance of the poppy, that it was not just for remembrance but for peace and hope for the future. He also stressed the Poppy Appeal funds are used support exservice men and women who had been scarred physically or mentally by war.

Finally the children placed crosses in a plot of remembrance

Repatriation - Royal Marine James Holloway

Wed 8th November saw the repatriation of Royal Marine James Holloway. The details of his death have not been disclosed. However the passing of the cortege at the "Final Turn" en route to the John Radcliffe was honoured in the traditional way.

Among those in attendance were the Lord Mayor of Oxford, The Chief Inspector of Police, RBL county chairman, RBL Oxford City president also 25 veterans from the three armed services and about 150 members of the general public.

At the passing of the cortege Associations and RBL standards were lowered including Coldstream Guards, Household Division(Banbury), Royal Dragoon Guards. RBL Islip, Kidlington, Marston, Oxford City, Peppard (Colin Davies) Henley-on-Thames (John Green). This brief but solemn event has, fortunately, become less frequent in recent years

Wreath laying - 13 October 2017

A wreath was laid by John Green on behalf of the Branch at the memorial of the battle of Hohenzollern Redoubt fought near the village of Auchy les Mines in France 13/14 October 1915 by 46th (North Midland) Division (TF). The Division suffered 3,763 casualties of which 1308 were killed and only 7% have known graves. John's father, then a sergeant with 1st/8th Bn Sherwood Foresters was awarded the Military Medal.

The wreath laying ceremony was attended by associations representing the counties of Leicestershire, Staffordshire, Lincolnshire, Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire whose territorial regiments suffered so greatly.



The Mayor of Auchy les Mines laid a wreath. Standard bearers of local ex-service organisations also attended. After the ceremony the Mayor invited participants to "vin d'honneur" and splendid buffet at the village hall.
